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HUMANKIND Be Both.

Dear Luther Memorial,

Perhaps you've seen this on a bumper sticker. I follow a particular person on TikTok who owns a hat embroidery company and his signature cap is this saying. On a black cap he embroiders the word "human" in variegated shades of flesh and "kind" in the colors of the rainbow. While I was living on East Avenue, I would walk my dog Vesper near East Middle School and they often had this saying flashing on their electronic sign.

Whether you've seen it on bumper stickers, hats, signs, or never before until I just posted it above, I don't want us to just glance over this simple statement.

This month, our students at LMA are being reminded that they are Created To Be...KIND. It's a simple word, kind. I'm not sure I hear it very often in common conversation as much as perhaps I did in school. And I will be honest, I'm not sure I see it as a character trait of as many people and I think I should in the world today. A quick glance at the newspaper opinion section or at Facebook posts or perhaps around the holiday dinner table and maybe you've noticed the same thing.

Kind is a powerful way to live in the world. It is by no means meek and mild. It is not a blushing flower or doormat. It is not agreeing for the sake of not rocking the boat. It is not even the same as liking someone. Kind is how we are called to live out the love for one another—and all humanity—in the way Jesus invited us to. Perhaps you've heard another common saying, "You don't need to *like* someone to *love* them"? That's kind.

Kind is recognizing the innate worth of our fellow human beings. It is seeing the Image of God in everyone we encounter *and treating them as such*. Kind is correcting with love, admonishing with patience, disagreeing with grace. Kind does not mean always getting along, but rather not walking away. Kind is what we are called to in Christian Community.

Let me be clear: Kind is hard.

It is much more satisfying to bite back. It is way easier to give in to our emotions and instincts and protect ourselves—physically and emotionally—even if it is at the expense of someone else. But nevertheless, let us be reminded this month with our students that we are all created by God to be Kind. And let us strive for the better things, lean into Jesus' call to love, and rest heavily in the Spirit who makes it possible.

Faith and Society

We continue our feature of Social Statements of the ELCA leading up to Church Wide Assembly 2025. In order of approval and publication, this month we study *Health and Healthcare* (2003).

A reminder that the summaries in our newsletter are presented on the ELCA church-wide website and were developed by the *Theological Discernment Department* in the Office of the Presiding Bishop.

In future editions we will explore other Social Statements in order of their approval and endorsement. So, you can look forward to: Human Sexuality (2009); Genetics (2011); The Church and Criminal Justice (2013); Sexism (2019).

"Caring for Health: Our Shared Endeavor" Social Statement Summary

Like many social statements of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), "Caring for Health: Our Shared Endeavor" starts with a description of the social situation, explores biblical and theological themes, and then lays out implications. Section One acknowledges the crisis in health care in the U.S. and describes Christian responsibility. Section Two turns to the Bible and theology to establish basic principles and define terms such as "healing," "cure" and "illness." The vision of health as a shared endeavor in Section Three rests in a biblical view that wholeness is a blessing that God intends for all (1Thessalonians 5:23). In this vision, "A ministry of healing is integral to the life and mission of the Church" (p. 9). Guided by this vision, the statement addresses the health care system and its primary parts, from congregations to medical research. Sections Four and Five are dedicated to specific recommendations about equitable access to health care for all, and provide ethical guidance for individuals and families.

The title captures the theme of the statement: caring for health is a shared endeavor, an endeavor that requires sustained and determined effort from all of us. Each of us bears some responsibility for his or her own health, but health and health care also depend upon other people and conditions in the wider society. Such interdependence is at odds with the common message of this individualistic society, but it flows from the biblical vision of wholeness.

The biblical vision challenges the belief that illness equals disease and health equals cure. There are deeper dimensions to healing, such as restoration to God, and life within a community of meaningful relationships. "'Being well' for Christians does not mean we are untouched by pain and suffering. Human beings are finite and vulnerable, and so we recognize limits on what health and health care can mean" (p. 6). Being well for Christians means that we are able to participate in Christ's love by giving ourselves for others. We share their suffering in response to Christ, who bore the suffering of all.

The statement's vision means that health care should not be organized primarily for profitability: "Although health care goods and services may be bought and sold, health care is above all an activity of caring that grows out of relationships of mutual responsibility, concern and trust — and that cannot be reduced to a commodity" (p. 6). Rather, the statement concludes, "...health care is the kind of good most appropriately given on the basis of need" (p. 18). It specifies, "At a minimum, each person should have ready access to basic health care services that include preventive, acute, and chronic physical and mental health care at an affordable cost" (p. 13). Rather than encouraging privatization, the belief that health is a shared endeavor "makes public health services... the foundation for any health care system" (p. 13).

Since the vision encompasses the physical, mental and spiritual dimensions of people's lives, this church believes health care involves more than doctors, nurses and hospitals. Each of us has responsibility "to be a good steward of his or her own health out of thankfulness for the gift of life and in order to serve God and the neighbor." (p. 7) This requires a number of activities: keeping healthy habits, seeking preventive health care, attention to spiritual exercises and action in our callings as citizens.

The statement asserts that congregations are in the health care "business" because they are centered in word and sacrament ministry, which offers "salvation" ("salvation" is from the Latin word for healing or wholeness). Congregations are to encourage healing through vibrant prayer, services of healing, pastoral care and congregational health ministries. The statement also recognizes and celebrates the many contributions that ELCA social ministry organizations make through "respectful and equitable attention to the physical, mental and spiritual needs of those persons served" (p. 11). The vision of the shared endeavor means that the church is called to be an active participant in fashioning a just and effective health care system. The primary concern of the statement is achieving equitable access to basic health care for all, and so the statement calls the whole ELCA to commit itself to this goal (p. 18). The ethical principles of agape, love and justice are to guide that participation.

In 2003 the statement called for reform of the U.S. health care system: "The United States does not currently have a health care system that is capable of care for all people. Significant changes in financing and structure are therefore required" (p. 13). The statement did not name a particular system for achieving that reform but rather concluded: "Our obligation could be met through any one of several combinations of personal, market and governmental means, although none of these means alone can provide equitable access to health care" (p. 19).

Prayer Partners

The Prayer Partners of Luther Memorial Church has 11 dedicated members that meet every 6-8 weeks to review those on the prayer lists. They are faithful in praying and keeping the reasons for prayers confidential. There are 3 prayer lists:



- The short-term list is 1 year or less (i.e accidents, hospitalizations, surgery, new acute illness)
 - The short-term list will be in the bulletin each Sunday.
- The long-term list is **up to 2 years** (i.e cancer treatment, dementia, addiction, personal issues)
 - The long-term list will be at the welcome table each Sunday for those members who want to include them in their prayers.
 - o Our military men and women are included with the long-term list.
- The private list is confidential and is only seen by the prayer group members and Norma.
- The Grief listing will continue to be in the bulletin and the loved one will be listed for one (1) month.

Ash Wednesday

Wednesday Lenten Worship



We will be sharing worship and study around the life of Dietrich Bonhoeffer in a series called *Lessons from Dietrich Bonhoeffer in a House Divided and a World on Fire*. About this curriculum and worship series from the International Bonhoeffer Society, English Division, LAMPa writes:

Through our work at the intersection of civic life and faith, we often encounter a Church and world grappling with deep divisions and deep questions about what it means to be disciples of Jesus Christ. How does one hold onto their convictions while staying in relationship with their neighbor? How does one engage passionately and peacefully? What is the most faithful path to take where hatred and spite seem to reign?

Like many, we turned to the example of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Not because of the superficial tendency of any "side" to equate the other side" with Adolf Hitler and Nazi Germany, but because Bonhoeffer's writings give us great insight to the struggle of figuring out what is the next most faithful step in a broken and imperfect system.

We were delighted that our wonderings about what wisdom Bonhoeffer might offer us led us to Dr. Lori Brandt Hale of Augsburg University. In her role as the President of the International Bonhoeffer Society – English Language Section, which marks its 50th anniversary this year, she is well-versed in talking about Bonhoeffer with nuance, scholarship, and wisdom. And the Society was wondering about ways in which they could make the academic conversations happening around the anniversary accessible to more people. We were happy to be a catalyst to make that happen.

As Lutherans, we know that there are certain hermeneutics, ways of reading and interpreting, that can lead to grace-filled understanding, or that lead to condemnation. We practice distinguishing these in the ways we read the Bible, remembering Luther's exhortation that the Bible is "the cradle in which the Christ Child is laid." Where other harmful hermeneutics ignore Christ in favor of ideological interpretations, we hold Christ at the center.

Dr. Brandt Hale helps us understand that a similar tactic is needed in approaching the work of Bonhoeffer. Like the Bible, one can read any number of agendas or ideologies into Bonhoeffer's words. But like any good Luther theologian, Bonhoeffer himself would insist that centering him and his words would be a mistake. "Who is Christ for us today?" is the question Bonhoeffer came back to again and again, in his writing and in discerning steps to take in his discipleship. Centering that question led him to reject the Nazi regime and other forces that sought to harm his most vulnerable neighbors.

This curriculum encourages us to ask that question for ourselves. In this particular time and place, who is Christ for us? How are we to best love our neighbors? What is the ethic of love and discipleship that will help us to be most faithful? What are the tools at our disposal to live this out?

The answers to those questions, we believe, are crucial for us to answer as individuals and as a Church. We are so grateful for the work of Dr. Brandt Hal in giving us a space and the resources to ask them, and to discern the answers together.

We hope this curriculum inspires your congregation to enter into deeper relationship with Christ and our neighbors, and to be bolder in calling out forces that breed misinformation and violence. May we always seek to answer the call of Christ to be and love our neighbor, this year and always.

There will be two opportunities on Wednesdays in Lent to gather for worship and learning.

- 6. St. Matthew's Endowment Determining the possibility of "St. Matthew's" being one with Luther Memorial. Greg Kern has checked with UBS and ELCA regarding the merger of the accounts.
 - a. If MOMS (Member Outreach Ministry) continues to be paid a separate account will be necessary at UBS.
 - i. On motion it was unanimous that a request for \$500 be granted.
- 7. Hospitality Committee Continues to look for a volunteer to head this committee.
- 8. Treasurer's Report Showed that money from the Memorial Fund was moved to cover carpet cost. A CD that matured was reinvested at a good interest rate. On motion the Treasurer's Report was unanimously accepted.
