¹⁹Now we know that, whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For no human will be justified before God by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin. ²¹But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed and is attested by the Law and the Prophets, ²²the righteousness of God through the faith of Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, ²³since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; ²⁴they are now justified by God's grace as a gift,

through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. This was to demonstrate God's righteousness, because in divine forbearance God had passed over the sins previously committed; ²⁶it was to demonstrate at the present time God's own righteousness, so that God is righteous and that God justifies the one who has the faith of Jesus. ²⁷Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. Through what kind of law? That of works? No, rather through the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.







Do this for the remembrance of me.


- And so we remember your Word, his life, his death, and his glorious resurrection, his presence in this meal around the world, and we proclaim the mystery of our faith:

All are invited to the Meal. If you would like to participate but not to receive the bread and wine, please cross your arms in front of you for a blessing from the pastor.



Worship Matters

Affirmation of Baptism? What about "Confirmation?" The rites and rituals around "Confirmation" are not a separate act but rather deeply tied to the baptismal covenant. Our youth are not experiencing something new today but rather *affirming* the covenant God has already made with them in baptism...they're just now old enough to answer for themselves in a way they perhaps were not able to at the time of baptism.

In holy baptism the triune God delivers us from the forces of evil, puts our sinful self to death, gives us new birth, adopts us as children, and makes us members of the body of Christ, the Church. The Christian community at worship celebrates God's gift of baptism in a number of ways. The sacrament itself normally takes place in the midst of the worshiping assembly as a sign that in baptism we are made one with Christ and with the whole people of God. On behalf of the whole church, we promise support to new siblings, confess the faith with them, and welcome them into the body of Christ. Water connected to the Word—God's saving promise in Jesus Christ—is at the center of the baptismal celebration. Although a person is baptized only once, the gift of baptism continues throughout a Christian's life. Instruction in the faith for a life of discipleship is part of the preparation of those who are to be baptized or their parents and sponsors. The ongoing nurture of that faith is part of the congregation's ministries of formation, education, service, and evangelical witness.

Affirmation of Baptism, then, may be used at many times in the life of a baptized Christian. It is especially appropriate as part of a process of formation in youth and young adulthood (confirmation), at the time of beginning one's participation in a community of faith, as a sign of renewed participation in the life of the church, or at the time of a significant life passage.

Today, our youth say: Someone loved me enough to have me baptized. I'm glad they did, because now I know why. And they are choosing to continue to live into the promises God made with them, with their families, with all of us in baptism: to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper regularly, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through their words and through their deeds, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in the earth. May we, with them, remember our own baptismal covenants with God and answer: I do, and I ask God to help and guide me.

Readings and Commemorations This Week

October 28 – Simon and Jude, Apostles – Jeremiah 26:1-16; Psalm 11; I John 4:1-6; John 12:21-27 – We know little about these apostles. Simon is listed as "the zealot" or Cananean in New Testament lists. Jude, also called Thaddeus, asked Jesus at the last supper why he had revealed himself to the disciples but not to the world.

October 29 – Psalm 119:17-24; II Kings 6:8-23; Acts 9:32-35

October 30 – Psalm 119:17-24; Jeremiah 33:1-11; Matthew 20:29-34

October 31 – Reformation Day – Jeremiah 31: 31-34; Psalm 46; Romans 3:19-28; John 8:31-36 -- By the end of the seventeenth century, many Lutheran churches celebrated a festival commemorating Martin Luther's posting of the Ninety-five Theses, a summary of abuses in the church of his time. At the heart of the reform movement was the gospel, the good news that it is by grace through faith that we are justified and set free.

November 1 – All Saints' Day – Wisdom 3:1-9; Psalm 24; Revelation 21:1-6a; John 11:32-44 -- The custom of commemorating all of the saints of the church on a single day goes back at least to the third century. Traditionally this day was the day to celebrate all those saints who had not otherwise been celebrated on a particular feast day throughout the rest of the year. With a later understanding from the Reformation, this day came to include all the baptized who had died.

November 2 – Commemoration of the Faithful Departed – Isaiah 25:6-9; Psalm 116:10-17; I Thessalonians 4:13-18; John 6:51-58 – Distinct from All Saints' Day, the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed—sometimes known as All Souls' Day—is the day when we remember all of our beloved dead. This is the opportunity to give thanks for their witness in our lives, the ways they shaped us in faith, the example they left for us. All Saints' Day on the previous day is often a celebration of all who have died, but in the history of the Church such a day was for those Saints that were not otherwise celebrated during the year. In our Lutheran understanding that all the baptized as both "saint" and "sinner" we have often shared the celebration between the two days.
