The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We'd expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus finds the power of God better imaged in a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.





CHILDREN'S SERMON – (10:30 am Service)

WORD - "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

Tree imagery is used in a messianic prophecy to tell how the LORD will choose someone from Judah's royal family (the cedar tree) to reign over all creation.

This tree will be planted on Mount Zion, the location of the holy temple.

SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:6-10 [11-13] 14-17

⁶So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord—⁷for we walk by faith, not by sight. ⁸Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. ⁹So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. ¹⁰For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil.

[11] Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we try to persuade others; but we ourselves are well known to God, and I hope that we are also well known to your consciences. 12 We are not commending ourselves to you again, but giving you an opportunity to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast in outward appearance and not in the heart. 13 For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. 14 For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. 15 And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them.



SERMON Pastor Coleman





If you are not going to receive Holy Communion, but would like to receive a blessing, please come forward with your arms crossed over your chest.





Presque Isle ProMusica

Presque Isle ProMusica (a chamber orchestra in residence at Luther Memorial) will present a series of free concerts throughout the summer. As we all monitor our community's progress and response to the pandemic, they have chosen to ease back into live performances with small ensemble concerts.

Today at 7:00pm, they will present the Chautauqua Brass performing in our nave. Some members of this ensemble have previously played at Luther Memorial and liked the acoustics so much they had scheduled a concert for April, 2020. Unfortunately, that concert had to be cancelled due to the pandemic.

Founded in 2018, this brass quartet includes trumpeter Landon Gray and three trombonists: Devin Bennett, tenor; Bobby Fisco, alto & tenor; and Daniel Marion, bass. They play both ancient and modern music, composed, or arranged, for brass. The group also has a keen focus on music education and musicians' wellness. In addition to their performances, they offer educational workshops and master classes for student musicians of all ages.

Their program for us will include music by Morley, Haydn, Dvorak, Gliere and Bruckner, some traditional pieces arranged for them, more recent hits by Harold Arlen, Erroll Garner and Bela Fleck – old favorites and some enchanting surprises. The concert promises to combine virtuosity with sheer fun with Brian Hannah of WQLN serving as host and interviewer.

Presque Isle ProMusica concerts are free and open to the public. Free-will donations will be accepted at the door. Luther Memorial's current COVID-19 protocols will be in effect. Please consult future church newsletters and bulletin announcements for more information about the remaining concerts to be held on the second Sunday of the months June through September.

Worship

At Luther Memorial Church we are thankful that we are able to provide at home communion. Understanding that the bread and wine is a sustaining gift from Jesus that is blessed and received in community, we now have available bread and wine in individual packets that, after being blessed on Sunday morning during our worship, will be available for those worshipping from home to pick up at the church during the week. The intention is that you take home enough bread and wine for each member of your family for the month. During our worship service, those worshipping from home would set before them the consecrated bread and wine, and then receive the bread and wine during worship.
