

forgive our appetite for unhealthy fare.


When your gospel challenges us,


forgive our irritable complaints.



In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not." ⁹Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites: 'Draw near to the Lord, for the Lord has heard your complaining.' " ¹⁰And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the

Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. ¹¹The Lord spoke to Moses, ¹²"I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God.' ¹³In the evening quails came up and covered the camp, and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. ¹⁴When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. ¹⁵When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat."

This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin.


Do this for the remembrance of me.

As you return by the side aisles, please place your empty cup in the tray.


All are invited to the Meal. If you would like to participate but not to receive the bread and wine, please cross your arms in front of you for a blessing from the pastor.





Worship Matters

About the Hymn of the Day *The Rice of Life*: "What if wheat was not the basic, staple grain of our diet? This hymn looks at the sixth chapter of John through the lens of an Asian diet. The text writer takes John 6 and retranslates it to "The living rice . . . came down eternal life to give." While it may feel strange in our mouths, it would make sense in Malaysia, where this text originated. The tune comes from a folk melody of the Bunan tribe, who are the native people of Taiwan still living in the inner regions of the country. Scholar and hymnist I-to Loh wrote down some of their songs, including this rice-pounding song, and gave it new life as a Christian hymn."

This note in *All Creation Sings* explains that rice, not bread, is a staple of life in many Asian cultures, and that this hymn expands our metaphors for holy communion and contextualizes the image of Jesus as the bread of life in John 6. Bread in Old and New Testament times did not look like nor probably taste like what people in the West call bread. The "staple of life" is what "bread" means. As I-to Loh (b. September 28, 1936), this tune's composer, says, "For the Iban of Malaysia, rice is the basic ingredient of a meal. J. Andrew Fowler (March 7, 1935-January 5, 2021), an American Methodist missionary in Malaysia, wrote this hymn "to interpret the unfamiliar concept of Western bread in the primarily rice-oriented societies in Asia."

J. Andrew Fowler's father was a medical doctor who planned to go to the Belgian Congo in 1932 as a medical missionary, but the Great Depression prevented that. The younger Fowler became a teacher, pastor, and missionary, who studied at Southwestern University and at Perkins School of Theology of Southern Methodist University. He held many positions in Methodist churches, schools, and world-wide councils in the United State and Asia as a teacher, principal, pastor, missionary, board member, and executive secretary. In addition to numerous articles, he wrote two hymns, this one and "The Lord is Pure Unbounded Love," both included in *Sound the Bamboo*).

Let us, then, sing with our siblings in Asia of Christ who is both Bread and Rice—sustenance and staple food, the very nourishment that satisfies our cravings.

News from the Lutheran World Federation

COMMON STATEMENT ON THE FILIOQUE

The Joint International Commission on Theological Dialogue Between the Lutheran World Federation and the Orthodox Church

We, representatives of The Lutheran World Federation and the Orthodox Church, have come together in a spirit of love and Christian communion to discuss the Church-dividing issue of the procession of the Holy Spirit. We both affirm the full divinity and personhood of the Holy Spirit, which was expressed in different ways in the eastern and the western traditions. We know that the Filioque was inserted in the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed by the Latin Church in response to the heresy of Arianism centuries after the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed's composition. The Eastern Church has always protested this insertion. As part of the Latin tradition, the reformers inherited the Creed with the Filioque and did not consider it problematic. Valuing this old and most venerable ecumenical Christian text, we suggest that the translation of the Greek original (without the Filioque) be used in the hope that this will contribute to the healing of age-old divisions between our communities and enable us to confess together the faith of the Ecumenical Councils of Nicaea (325 CE) and Constantinople (381 CE).

The Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed is a doctrinal statement used in the liturgy. The people of God pray the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed and in that prayer their faith is shaped by the Triune God. Renewed focus on the original wording of the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed may encourage renewed theological reflection on the Trinity and the role of the Holy Spirit.

Moreover, we both affirm that in our Trinitarian doctrine the Father is the cause (αἴτίος) of the generation of the Son and of the procession of the Spirit. The Orthodox understand that the Filioque was often meant to underline the relationship between the Son and the Spirit and the Lutherans are aware that in the Orthodox tradition the Spirit is sometimes conceived as proceeding (ἐκπορευόμενον) through the Son. We are also aware that there are other ways to indicate the relationship of the Son and the Spirit. We hope that the exploration of the formula "through the Son" used by Maximus the Confessor, John of Damascus, and Tarasius of Constantinople and relevant views by Gregory of Cyprus and Gregory Palamas, might facilitate our common effort to reach further agreement regarding the procession of the Holy Spirit.

August 8 – Dominic, founder of the Order of Preachers, 1221 – Psalm 96:1-7; Romans 10:13-17; John 7:16-18 – Dominic was a Spanish priest who saw the wealth of the clergy as a stumbling block for the church, so he formed a movement, the Order of Preachers (commonly called Dominicans) devoted to itinerant preaching and living in poverty.

August 9 – Psalm 34:1-8; II Samual 17:15-29; Galatians 6:1-10

August 10 – **Lawrence, deacon, martyr, 258** – Psalm 112:1-9; II Corinthians 9:6-10; John 12:24-26 -- As one of the seven deacons of the church at Rome, Lawrence was responsible for the church's financial matters and for the care of the poor. Asked by the emperor to gather the church's treasure, he presented a collection of orphans, lepers, and the like. The enraged emperor had him put to death.
