- ▶ You became truly human in Jesus our brother. For forty days, with fasting and prayer, he renounced the power of the devil.







Worship Matters

The Great Litany has traditionally been how the Church begins the season of Lent. The season of Lent is one of repentance—of returning to God with our whole hearts—in which the other "stuff" of life is parred away until we can focus on the Central Things: the sacraments, prayer, the cross, Jesus in our midst. When we focus on these things we are driven to cling to God in prayer. Yet, baptized into the Christian community we do not pray for ourselves alone but for all of creation which shows the wounds and scars of humanity—greed, hatred, hurt, etc. Having reminded one another to "Come, let us return to the Lord…" on Ash Wednesday, we enter into this season more fully by beginning with prayer in the Litany.

The Great Litany is an ancient prayer that has grown over time. In praying it, we join our voices with saints of the Church throughout the ages and in all places. It was in use long before Luther and was used often. It was prayed at the daily offices of the church (the prayer on the canonical hours) and even many Sundays. While some in the early reformation wanted to remove its use, Luther instead edited the litany and even recommends its usage by his congregation in Wittenberg: "This might help if at Matins, Vespers, or after the sermon, we had the Litany sung or read in the church, especially by the young folk." We join our voices, then, with Luther and all the Church in prayer for a world that is still desperately in need of God's mercy and grace. And we continue the practices and disciplines of prayer into the coming season.

Readings and Commemorations This Week

March 10 – Harriet Tubman, 1913; Sojourner Truth, 1883, renewers of society – Wisdom 8:24-28; Psalm 146; Luke 11:5-10 -- Harriet Tubman, born into slavery, helped about 300 others to escape slavery until the institution was abolished. Sojourner Truth, whose birth name was Isabella, was freed after slavery was abolished, and discerned a call to be a preacher. Taking the name Sojourner Truth, she set out on an evangelistic journey, where people found her testimony to be deeply moving.

March 11 - Psalm 17; Zechariah 3:1-10; II Peter 2:4-21

March 12 – **Gregory the Great, Bishop of Rome, 604** – I Chronicles 25:1a, 6-8; Psalm 57:6-11; Mark 10:42-45 -- Born into wealth and power, Gregory was for a time the chief administrator of the city of Rome. Giving this up for a life in the church, he was elected pope in 590. He influenced public worship through the establishment of a lectionary and prayers to correlate with the readings. Gregorian chant is named in his honor.
