#### Worship

Our prelude begins at 10:25 each week and flows into the 10:30am worship time. We hope that this will draw us together and into our time of worship. Please remember to be mindful of those around you and those worshiping at home by keeping conversations and visiting to the lobbies once the prelude has begun. Thank you.

A reminder that our livestream runs from the beginning of the prelude through the end of the postlude. To maintain a worshipful space for those joining from home, please remember to leave the chancel area (the area around the altar) clear until after the postlude.

#### **Worship Matters**

**Do things seem** a little out of order this morning? Were you surprised that the blessing over the Cup was given *before* the blessing over the Bread? Don't be too surprised! In this Eucharistic Prayer, which we will be using for the summer, the order of things is a little out of the order we usually experience. But the source of this prayer is different. In the early church every community had their own practices around Communion. The prayers they said, the way things were distributed, which readings there were, the singing, who could be there...all of it depended on where in the early Church you lived. Later on into the 5th century everything became much more solidified into what we think of on Sunday morning. This is known as the Latin (or Western) Rite. It comes mostly from the Church in Rome. We can see many of these same practices we share on Sunday morning in the writings of a man called Justin Martyr who wrote amply on the practices of the Church in Rome before his martyrdom. But early—much—earlier than that there was a community that wrote down their practices as a community. The writing became known as The Didache. Things are very different in this community. But the influence of this corner of the Church is still felt. "As the grains of wheat once scattered on the hill were gathered into one to become our bread, so may all your people from all the ends of earth be gathered into one in you." This hymn by Marty Haugen comes directly from prayers in the Didache. And you can hear similar in the Eucharistic Prayer. This Eucharistic Prayer draws on the traditions of the Didache community and was composed by Pastor Jay. As we hear more and more themes around Bread this summer (the last five weeks of summer will be all about Bread), switching things around a little adds emphasis and draws out attention to what we are gathering around.

#### **Readings and Commemorations This Week**

- **June 3 -- The Martyrs of Uganda, 1886** Psalm 138; Hebrews 10:32-39; Matthew 24:9-14 -- On June 3, 1886, thirty-two young men were burned to death for refusing to renounce Christianity. The confident manner in which these Christians went to their deaths contributed to a much stronger Christian presence in Uganda.
- **June 4 John XXIII, Bishop of Rome, 1963** Ezekiel 34:11-6; Psalm 84; I Peter 5:1-4; John 21:15-17 -- When elected pope, the former Angelo Roncalli was expected to be a short-term caretaker. He showed great spirit, though, and convened the Second Vatican Council which helped bring great changes to Roman Catholic and other churches.
- **June 5 Boniface, Bishop of Mainz, missionary to Germany, martyr, 754** Psalm 115:1-8; Acts 20:17-28; Luke 24:44-53 -- Boniface was a native of England who became a Benedictine monk and was called to missionary work among the Vandal tribes of Germany. With fellow workers, he established churches and schools, and he also worked to reform the church.
- **June 6 William Alfred Passavant, renewer of society, 1894** Genesis 22:9-14; Psalm 10; John 9:1-4 -- William Passavant helped to establish hospitals and orphanages in a number of cities and was the first to introduce deaconesses to the work of hospitals in the United States.
- **June 7 Seattle, chief of the Duwamish Confederacy, 1866 --** Micah 6:6-8; Psalm 19; I Corinthians 1:26-31; Luke 6:20-23 -- Noah Seattle led a coalition of tribes, and convinced them to live peacefully with encroaching white settlers. When he became a Roman Catholic, he held morning and evening prayer with his tribe. The city of Seattle is named for him.
