





White grape juice is in pre-filled cups for those who cannot have alcoholized wine.


Baked bread is being used. For those who so desire, gluten-free wafers are available; please let the pastor know.

As you return by the side aisles, please place your empty cup in the tray.


All are invited to the Meal. If you would like to participate but not to receive the bread and wine, please cross your arms in front of you for a blessing from the pastor.



#### Worship *Matters!*

Where's the Creed? In our order of worship (the *Ordo*, in Latin), the Word portion of the liturgy usually follows a particular order: God speaks to us through Scripture, God speaks to us through preaching, we proclaim the Word of God to one another through the Hymn of the Day, and then we profess our faith often through one of the ecumenical creeds (Nicene, Apostles', or Athanasian). However, there are other days when we gather that we profess our faith in different ways: with a baptism or special blessing for example. This week, we profess our faith through installing our congregational council members. Since we profess our faith in this way and through various other ways throughout the worship service, we do not need to *also* profess our faith through the recitation of the Apostles' Creed. We will continue using the Apostles' Creed next week!

Perhaps you've wondered why we use the different Creeds, when we use them. There is a formula for this: We use the Nicene Creed for Festivals of the Church (White and Red Days) when we join with the whole Church in confessing our faith. We use the Apostles' Creed on ordinary Sundays (Green). During Lent (Purple Days) we use the Apostles' Creed because this is the Creed we profess at baptisms—a tradition from the earliest Church. Because Lent has an emphasis on the baptismal journey and accompanying those who prepare for baptism, we use the Apostles' Creed on these Sundays to. So the next time we share a Creed together, consider why we're using that particular one and what we are professing by using it.

As for the Athanasian Creed, this is one of the ecumenical creeds that the Lutherans share with other church bodies, however it is rarely if ever used in worship. Sometimes we use it on Trinity Sunday because of its emphasis on the Three Persons of the Trinity. However, it is more meant for contemplation and study than shared profession in worship.

#### **Experience Choir Sunday**

On March 2 we will celebrate Transfiguration and the end of the Epiphany season. With the changing of the season I would like to extend an open invitation to everyone to "Experience Choir". Regardless of background, experience, age or ability, we will be joined by community members and past choir members to learn and refine the Anthem, Psalm, and Gospel Acclamation for Transfiguration.

With emphasis on our communal song, the choir is tasked with preparing not only an anthem, but to review all liturgical music to provide the necessary leadership on more challenging pieces enhancing the familiar and forging the way for new favorite traditions.
