



⁷ For you have been my helper, and under the shadow of your wings I will rejoice.



SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 10:1-13



For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. ⁵Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness. ⁶Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. ⁷Do not become idolaters as some of them did, as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." ⁸We must not engage in sexual immorality, as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. ⁹We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. ¹⁰And do not complain, as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. ¹¹These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. ¹²So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. ¹³No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing God will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.


THE PEACE

please cross your arms in front of you for a blessing from the pastor.



Worship Matters!

Seem like something's missing this Lent? We have greatly abbreviated the Sending Rite of the service each week so that we go directly from the Table into our ministry in the world. Every week, each time we gather together, the Holy Spirit sends us in mission. Every time we gather around the Table, we are sent in the strength of this food. In this season in particular, we remember the travels of Elijah who traveled to the Mount of God for forty days and forty nights (sound familiar?) in the strength of food and drink brought to him by angels. As we share each of these weeks, we too are strengthened by food and drink—this time, the very food *of* angels, the Body and Blood of Jesus—and are sent out on our way.

And what about the new *ordo*? The confession and peace have moved. Each of these changes in this season has a reason: The first, the move of confession is from the beginning of our worship to the place where we usually recite the Creed. In this moment in the liturgy—the moment when we recall the promises of Baptism—we remember most especially the gift of forgiveness. By the Great Forgiveness that is flooded over us in baptism to the daily forgiveness we receive again and again from God, baptism is the way we live each day. In this season of repentance and of renewal of baptismal covenant, we highlight this by confessing our sins at the precise moment in the service we remember our baptism. By doing so we remember that we are forgiven before we even knew to ask.

And what about the peace? Why here? This is an optional place in the liturgy to share the peace. Whether before receiving the offering or before receiving Jesus in our hands and on our lips, we share the peace for precisely the reason we are reminded of in the service. Jesus commands that we reconcile with one another before approaching the Table. By placing the peace here, after the proclamation of the Eucharistic Prayer, we are reminded that it is only with Jesus in our midst that true peace and reconciliation are possible. So, with Jesus in our midst on the Table, we share the reconciliation and peace we have first been offered by Jesus.

Lent Opportunities

Lent with Dietrich is our series for our midweek gatherings this year. There are two opportunities to gather together:

- We will continue our afternoon gathering: 12:05 Worship followed by 12:30 Luncheon *and this year* followed by 1:00pm Learning.
- We have added an evening opportunity to gather. These gatherings will be the same material used in the afternoon: 6:00pm Worship followed by 6:30pm Learning. You are welcome to bring your own supper for the evening.

Additionally, Lent with Dietrich Devotional Books are available on all Welcome Tables. These daily devotions (except for Sundays) can serve as a great way to begin or end your day in prayer, Scripture, and reflection. And remember: we crafted this resource together!

Lenten Luncheons will be offered on Wednesdays in Lent; March 12 – April 9 at 12:30pm in fellowship hall. Enjoy a home-cooked meal for only \$10. Readings and Commemorations This Week

March 24 – **Oscar Arnulfo Romero, Bishop of El Salvador, martyr, 1980** – Ezekiel 20:40-42; Psalm 5; Revelation 6:9-11; Mark 8:34-48 -- Romero was deeply concerned with injustices evident toward the poor and powerless in El Salvador, and worked forthrightly against political repression. He was assassinated while presiding at the eucharist in a chapel near the cathedral in San Salvador.

March 25 – **THE ANNUNCIATION** – Isaiah 7:10-14; Psalm 45; Hebrews 10:4-10; Luke 1:26-38 -- *Nine months before Christmas we celebrate the annunciation, in which the angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she would give birth to the Son of God. The ancient church believed that this was also the date of the world's creation and of Jesus' death on the cross.*

March 26 – Psalm 39; Numbers 17:1-10; Romans 2:12-16

March 27 - Psalm 32; Joshua 4:1-13; II Corinthians 4:16-5:5

March 28 – Psalm 32; Joshua 4:14-24; II Corinthians 5:6-15

March 29 – Hans Nielson Hauge, renewer of the church, 1824 – Jeremiah 1:4-10; Psalm 46; I Corinthians 3:11-23; Mark 10:35-45 -- Hauge was a layperson who wished to revitalize the church in Norway. As a result of a mystical experience, he felt called to preach. Many professionals in the church feared his motives and influence, and he was imprisoned for leading unauthorized gatherings.
