MESSAGE FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG-AT-HEART

FIRST READING: Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

¹All the people of Jacob gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told Ezra the scribe to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the Lord had given to Israel. ²Accordingly, Ezra the priest brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. ³Ezra read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand, and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law. ⁵And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people, and when he opened it, all the people stood up. ⁶Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people answered, "Amen, Amen," lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshiped the Lord with their faces to the ground. ⁸So the Levites read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading. ⁹And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, "This day is holy to the Lord your God; do not mourn or weep." SECOND READING: I Corinthians 12:12-31a

¹²For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body— Jews or Greeks, slaves or free— and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. ¹⁴Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. 15 If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁶ And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as God chose. ¹⁹If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰As it is, there are many members yet one body. ²¹The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." ²²On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect, ²⁴whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, ²⁵that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it ²⁷Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. ²⁸And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. ²⁹Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work powerful deeds? ³⁰Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? ^{31a}But strive for the greater gifts.







Receive the bread in your open palm, then hold your cup steady for the assisting minister to fill.


As you return by the side aisles, please place your empty cup in the tray.





Worship Matters!

We include the Annual Meeting of the Congregation before the blessing and dismissal. By doing so, we include the business and work of being Church as part of our worship. We cannot separate what we say and proclaim and sing and share in worship from the work that we are called to do as Christ's Body in the world. Indeed, in his writing about the Sacrament of Holy Communion, St. Augustine writes, "Behold what you are. Become what you receive." As St. Paul reminds us this morning, we are the Body of Christ, though we come from our various backgrounds, places, statuses to this place for worship and fellowship, we come as the scattered grain is gathered into one loaf we share in the Sacrament. We are brought together to be for one another and for the world the very Body of Christ. As the one loaf is then divided and shared, the Body is broken for our sake, so when we leave this place we are scattered and shared with the world for all in need. So, this Sunday, we include the business—the ho-hum, everyday, mundane, and often boring parts—of being Church each and every day as part of our worship. So that, when we are dismissed and sent "to serve the Lord," we can confidently say, "We will!"

Worship

Pastor Erin Jones will preach at our services on Sunday, February 2. She will also lead our Adult Forum at 9:15. Pastor Jones is the Communications and Advocacy Engagement Manager for Lutheran Advocacy Ministries of Pennsylvania (LAMPa). She will preach at both services as we celebrate the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple.

Pastor Jones will also kick off our Adult Forum series on Luther Memorial's ministry partners. She will present on the current work being done by LAMPa. Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania is a state public policy office of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America serving the congregations, synods and Lutheran institutions in Pennsylvania, providing resources, training and information in the work of being a public church. Through faithful advocacy, the ELCA lives out our Lutheran belief that governments can help advance the common good. LAMPa is part of ELCA Witness in Society, whose advocacy works for change in public policy based on the experience of Lutheran ministries, programs and projects around the world and in communities across the United States. We work through political channels on behalf of the following biblical values: peacemaking, hospitality to strangers, care for creation, and concern for people living in poverty and struggling with hunger and disease.

Candlemas (2/2) is next Sunday! We will celebrate the end of the celebrations of the Incarnation with the remembrance of Jesus' Presentation in the Temple. This is also traditionally the day to bless the candles to be used in worship for the coming year. January 27 – Lydia, Dorcas, Phoebe, witnesses to the faith – Ecclesiasticus (Sirach) 2:7-11; Psalm 1; I Corinthians 1:26-31; Matthew 25:1-13 – Women as well as men were important Christian leaders from the beginning, as demonstrated by these co-workers of the apostle Paul. Lydia, a seller of purple goods, lent her home for a church; Dorcas was known for charitable works; and Phoebe was a deacon in the church at Cenchrae.

January 28 – **Thomas Aquinas, teacher, 1274** – Wisdom 7:7-14; Psalm 37:3-6, 32-33; I Corinthians 3:5-11; Matthew 13:47-52 -- One of the most brilliant and creative theologians in the church's history, Aquinas worked to bring together scripture and the philosophy of Aristotle. A member of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), Aquinas was also a hymnwriter.
