GOSPEL: Mark 5:21-43

²¹When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him, and he was by the sea. ²²Then one of the leaders of the synagogue, named Jairus, came and, when he saw Jesus, fell at his feet ²³ and pleaded with him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well and live." ²⁴So Jesus went with him. And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. ²⁵Now there was a woman who had been suffering from a flow of blood for twelve years. ²⁶She had endured much under many physicians and had spent all that she had, and she was no better but rather grew worse. ²⁷She had heard about Jesus and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, ²⁸for she said, "If I but touch his cloak, I will be made well." ²⁹Immediately her flow of blood stopped, and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. ³⁰Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my cloak?" ³¹And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?' ³²Jesus looked all around to see who had done it. ³³But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. ³⁴He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease." ³⁵While he was still speaking, some people came from the synagogue leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" ³⁶But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the synagogue leader, "Do not be afraid; only believe." ³⁷Jesus allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. ³⁸When they came to the synagogue leader's house, Jesus saw a

commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. ³⁹When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." ⁴⁰And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him and went in where the child was. ⁴¹Taking her by the hand, Jesus said to her, "Talitha koum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" ⁴²And immediately the girl stood up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. ⁴³Jesus strictly ordered them that no one should know this and told them to give her something to eat.





This is the second summer in a row that we are using ELW Setting I for our worship setting. Worship settings include a version of: Kyrie, Glory to God, This Is the Feast, Alleluia, and Lamb of God. Sometimes they include songs like "Now, Lord, You Let Your Servant Go in Peace" or "Thank the Lord". In the ELCA we have over 15 worship settings...and that's only in our primary worship resources of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* and *All Creation Sings*! Some of these are familiar. Some are less so. When we gather around these various settings we remember that the Church is more than just us but about innumerable people around the globe who gather around the same words of faith and love and life every Sunday and sing some of the same songs that we do! Readings and Commemorations This Week

- **July 1 Catherine Winkworth, 1878; John Mason Neale, 1866; hymn translators** II Chronicles 20:20-21; Psalm 96; Colossians 3:14-17; Matthew 13:44-52 -- Neale was an English priest who specialized in the translation of Latin and Greek hymns into English. Winkworth lived in Manchester, England, and devoted herself to translating German hymns. Almost all English-speaking hymnals include many of their translations.
- **July 2** Psalm 88; Leviticus 15:18-31; II Corinthians 9:1-5
- **July 3 Thomas, Apostle** Judges 6:36-40; Psalm 136:1-4, 23-26; Ephesians 4:11-16; John 14:1-7 -- Though frequently remembered as "doubting Thomas," this apostle also demonstrated a willingness to suffer and die with Jesus (John 11:16), and finally claimed the risen Christ as "my Lord and my God!" By tradition, he later worked as a missionary in India. Long commemorated on December 21, Thomas's celebration is moved to July 3 in agreement with ecumenical calendars.
- **July 4** Psalm 123; Jeremiah 7:1-15; I Corinthians 4:8-13
- **July 5** Psalm 123; Jeremiah 7:16-26; II Corinthians 10:7-11
- **July 6 Jan Hus, martyr, 1415** Ezekiel 20:40-42; Psalm 5; Revelation 6:9-11; Matthew 23:34-37 -- Hus was a Bohemian (present-day Czech Republic) priest who spoke against abuses in the church, and was seen by Martin Luther as his predecessor in the reforming movement. He was found guilty of heresy by a council of the church, and burned at the stake.
